- Case study analyses of significant legal decisions and their impact on society and individual rights.
- Debates and discussions on controversial legal issues, encouraging critical thinking and perspective-taking.
- Legal writing assignments, such as case briefs, memos, and opinion letters, to develop analytical and communication skills.

Process

- What insights can students gain from interacting with law enforcement officers, observing their daily operations, and discussing their challenges and dilemmas?
- In what ways can students engage with correctional facilities and community-based organizations to understand the realities of incarceration and inmates reentry into society?
