WHAT'S THE STORY?

A twelve-year old girl discovers a skeleton in a hidden room in her Lawrence, Kansas home. In her attempt to learn more about the skeleton, Dana discovers that her home was once a station on the Underground Railroad. The novel moves back and forth between present day and 1856.
